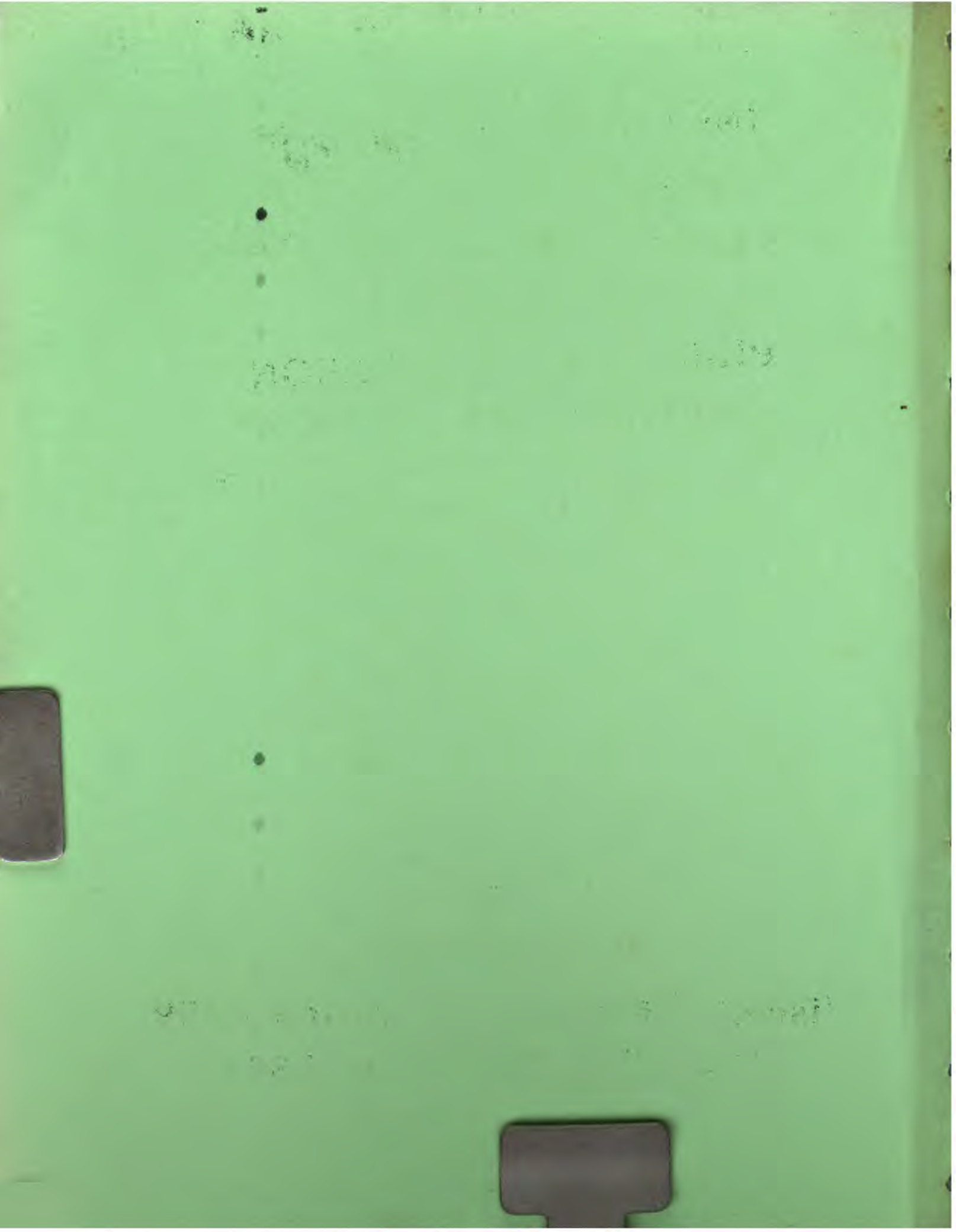

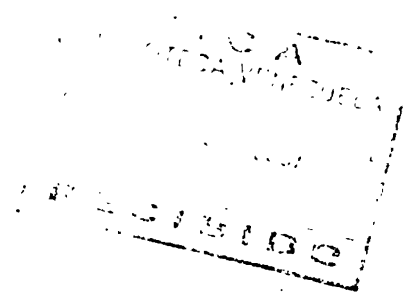

INTRODUCTION

This catalogue is presented with an admission of incompleteness and a hope for a better edition to follow it soon. It is far from a complete listing by way of comprehensiveness both of coverage as well as of individual entries. In other words it can have more entries and its entries could be more complete. What has been attempted here in this provisional edition is an identification of units as a basic first step so that it will stimulate interest and pave the way for a better version in which some of these inadequacies could be made good. The reasons for deciding to issue this version as it is, need to be stated and it is best done through setting out the sequence of events that led to its compilation.

The idea of such a listing providing information of a quick reference nature as well as being an inventory of strengths and weaknesses of the agricultural and agro-industrial production/distribution/service-complex in Jamaica was born when IICA/Jamaica Office in collaboration with the Ministry of Agriculture was developing plans for establishing a national agricultural information system for Jamaica. The intention was to compile two Directories (i) of Organizations in the Public and Private Sectors engaged in Agriculture, Agro-industry and other relevant and related areas; and (ii) of persons with specialized and technical skills engaged in activities in these fields. As indicated in the introductory letter sent with the original questionnaire circulated in December 1980 (reproduced in the Appendix) the intention was to include a profile for each unit prepared by the Unit itself so that the information will be as authentic and as complete as each unit's conception of itself.

The original questionnaire was addressed to 310 identified units throughout the island. After a reminder had been sent out in May 1981 a total of 75 completed questionnaires were returned and less than half of these were found to be suitable for use in compiling entries of the type envisaged for the proposed directory.

The text encourages organizations to take a proactive approach to internal control and to regularly review and update their internal control system to reflect changes in the business environment.

At this stage it was decided to compile a preliminary version using the originally identified list of units as a basis, developing this list as well as the information on each unit by utilization of as much data as possible from the returned questionnaires, and in addition researching other available sources for further details. There were two basic limitations within which the compiler had to work.

The first was the lack of a systematically organized collection of literature from which the desired information could be gleaned. This needs to be spelt out in order to indicate the role expected of libraries in collecting this type of seemingly 'value-less' documentation that does contain invaluable items of information not to be found anywhere else.

Annual reports and prospectuses of organizational units and private and public companies, publicity and information brochures, advertising pamphlets distributed at individual and collective displays and exhibitions, press notices and even press advertisements and labels of products are invaluable sources of information on the activities of a variety of organizations which together form what we have called the production/distribution/service-complex of our society. While traditionally followed methods of census taking and structured surveys are mechanisms that do periodically collect statistical data on this type of activity, such methods do not always succeed in providing as much descriptive data on such activities as is desirable for a variety of purposes at different times. This information could only be obtained from a systematically organized collection of material of the type indicated above, and for little cost, except for the time and the ingenuity of the system developed to collect, preserve and retrieve the information, such organized collections can be established and developed in libraries. This is a great need, and it should be recognized as such by those who plan and implement information systems. Both the difficulty of securing and the value of such information in an enquiry of this nature is discussed by R.S.N. Bax and M.A. Bax of the Administrative Staff College/Finance and Accounts College of Training in an introduction to their document titled 'The Public Sector (Register) 1981-82' (Kingston, 1982) issued by the Administrative Staff College, Jamaica.

12. The twelfth part of the document contains a list of appendices that provide additional information and data related to the study. This includes a detailed description of the data collection process and the results of the various tests.

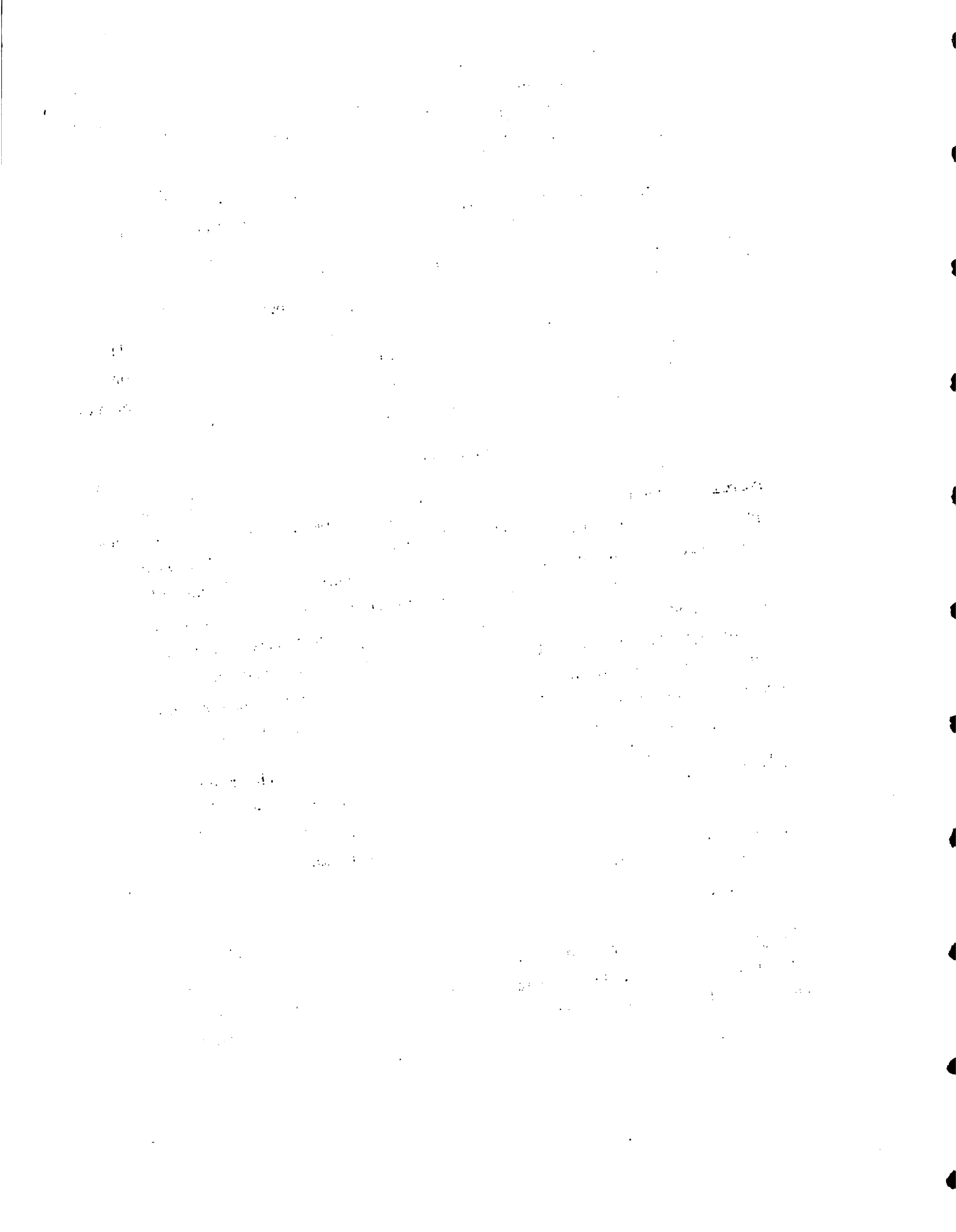
13. The thirteenth part of the document provides a list of references to the literature cited in the study. This provides a clear indication of the sources of information used to inform the research.

14. The fourteenth part of the document contains a list of figures and tables that are included in the study. This provides a clear indication of the visual aids used to present the data and findings.

The second limitation that curtailed efforts to further improve the contents of the entries was the fact that the compiler had to work on this project during his spare time - after working hours, during weekends and other brief periods snatched from the little 'spare' time available to a full-time employee. While the IICA/Jamaica Office supported the clerical and financial responsibility for the questionnaire, its reminder and the final production of the present version of the Directory, the compiler could not afford more time than had been spent on this version to make it sharper in its focus and richer in its content. Perhaps a fortnight spent with a desk and a telephone diligently dialling numbers and asking questions to seek the information needed from those who have it would have made it possible to do a better job, but unfortunately this was not possible.

In this context, one must make an observation in order to share a professionally significant experience gained and grasped through this exercise with fellow librarians and other information workers. It does appear that in developing countries, those responsible for handling information are so pre-occupied with the mechanics of handling information - in other words information technology - that they have little time to devote to the actual content of what they handle. This is due perhaps to the sophisticated technologies capable of handling vast quantities of information being developed and used in the developed world but not so readily available in the developing countries.

It must be realized that however sophisticated the technology utilized is, a system cannot provide access to more information than what has been made available to it. If a system for handling information is to be relevant and useful for local information, since most of this information exists only in a raw and scattered state, it must be processed or organized as an input for the system. Since in our context this processing needs to be done by the information handlers themselves, sufficient interest, time and energy must be devoted to this task if the parallel quantities of those ingredients devoted to the technology which produces the system itself are to bear fruit.



If knowing the strengths and weaknesses of the agricultural and agro-industrial production/distribution/service-complex that exists in Jamaica is useful, then this Directory would be worth the effort it has cost. If a more intelligent and a keener awareness of these capabilities is desirable, then it deserves a further effort and matching expense to make it a better tool, clearer in its focus and more pregnant in its content.

SOME EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR THE USER

ABBREVIATIONS

Except for the commonly used abbreviations such as St. (=Street) Ave. (=Avenue) etc., the only specific shortened form (acronym) used is MINAG which is an acronym for Ministry of Agriculture.

MAIN ENTRIES

Each numbered item in the listing is a main entry and carries all the information that has been gathered on that Unit or Institution. An institution or a unit that receives such an entry is, for the purpose of this listing, defined as an entity enjoying a separate existence as an individual body, regardless of its being linked with another institution in a parent/subsidiary, main body/branch, superior authority/responsible department relationship.

ADDITIONAL ENTRIES

All unnumbered entries are additional entries provided as guides for the convenience of users of the list. They are kept to a minimum to avoid unnecessary clutter, but it is hoped that there is a sufficient number of them to serve the purpose desired. It is expected that these additional entries with explanations (see also notes given from main entries) will provide sufficient cross-references to justify the arrangement in one alphabetical list without the provision of a separate index of terms or subjects.

STRUCTURE AND CONTENT OF A MAIN ENTRY

Each entry begins with its heading which is the name of the unit described. Immediately following are the address, telephone number(s), and thereafter a brief note designed to contain a description of its activities, history and other relevant information. While all these elements will be found in a complete entry, since the identification of the existence of a unit in itself is considered to be of value even if no further information could be collected, at the minimum level entries, only the names of the bodies so identified are given.

Mathematical Induction

Mathematical induction is a method for proving that a statement is true for all natural numbers. It consists of two main steps: the base case and the inductive step.

Base Case: Prove that the statement is true for the smallest natural number, usually 1.

Inductive Step: Assume the statement is true for a natural number n . Prove that it is also true for $n+1$.

Once both steps are completed, the statement is proven true for all natural numbers.

Mathematical induction is often used to prove properties of sequences, sums, and divisibility.

For example, to prove that the sum of the first n natural numbers is $\frac{n(n+1)}{2}$, we would use mathematical induction.
